On April 1, the House of Representatives passed the following pieces of legislation:

- H.R. 1589, the CBRN Intelligence and Information Sharing Act of 2019, which would direct the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to gather and analyze intelligence on terrorist threats involving chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear (CBRN) materials and to share that information with federal, state, and local authorities. DHS is currently carrying out activities similar to those required by H.R. 1589, so CBO estimates that implementing the act would not significantly affect spending by the department.
- H.R. 1593, the CLASS Act of 2019, which would establish within DHS a council to coordinate departmental policies and activities to enhance the security of schools.
   Based on the cost of similar councils, we estimate that implementing H.R. 1593 would have no significant costs.
