H.R. 7673 would require the Department of State to establish a program to recruit mid-career professionals from minority groups to join the U.S. Foreign Service. The department also would be required to provide those recruits with training and career development opportunities. Finally, the bill would require the department to report to the Congress on its implementation of the bill.

The department did not provide information about how it would implement H.R. 7673. Its Bureau of Global Talent Management has several ongoing efforts to recruit diverse employees for the Foreign Service; however, those are primarily aimed at entry-level personnel. The department is also developing a new program to recruit highly qualified mid-career professionals, but that program will not exclusively focus on minorities. The department does provide career development opportunities for employees from minority groups.

On the basis of information about those programs and similar reports, CBO estimates that some of the bill's requirements would be met with existing programs and resources and that any incremental efforts to implement H.R. 7673 would cost less than \$500,000 over the 2021-2025 period. Such spending would be subject to the availability of appropriated funds.
