S. 1160 would authorize appropriations over the 2022-2026 period for Department of State programs to reduce international trafficking in drugs. It would authorize appropriations of \$4 million each year to build the capacity of foreign law enforcement agencies to detect and track synthetic drugs such as fentanyl. It also would authorize appropriations of \$1 million each year for an international exchange program for professionals working to reduce the illicit use of drugs. CBO estimates that implementing S. 1160 would cost a total of \$15 million over the 2022-2027 period. The remainder of the \$25 million in authorized appropriations would be spent after 2027. Such spending would be subject to the appropriation of the specified amounts.

The bill also would require the department to report to the Congress on its progress in reducing drug trafficking. On the basis of information about similar requirements, CBO estimates that providing the required reports would cost less than \$500,000 over the 2022-2027 period.

The costs of the legislation, detailed in Table 1, fall within budget function 150 (international affairs).

On May 3, 2021, CBO transmitted a cost estimate for H.R. 2538, the FENTANYL Results Act, as ordered reported by the House Committee on Foreign Affairs on April 21, 2021. The two bills are similar. However, CBO's estimate of the budgetary effects of H.R. 2538 covered the 2022-2026 period; CBO's estimate for S. 1160 includes 2027 and is correspondingly higher.
