S. 3895 would extend the term of the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom through 2024 and authorize appropriations of \$3.5 million in 2023 and 2024 for its operations. The commission is an independent, bipartisan federal agency that monitors and promotes freedom of religion and belief in foreign countries. It also makes policy recommendations to the President, the Secretary of State, and the Congress.

CBO estimates that implementing H.R. 2538 would cost \$7 million over the 2022-2027 period. Such spending would be subject to the appropriation of the specified amounts.
