House Committee on Energy and Commerce

The Congressional Budget Act of 1974 requires the Congressional Budget Office, to the extent practicable, to prepare estimates of the budgetary effects of legislation ordered reported by Congressional authorizing committees. In order to provide the Congress with as much information as possible, the attached table summarizes information about the estimated direct spending and revenue effects of some of the legislation that has been ordered reported by the **House Committee on Energy and Commerce** during the 117th Congress. The legislation listed in this table generally would have small effects on direct spending or revenues, CBO estimates. Where possible, the table also provides information about the legislation's estimated effects on spending subject to appropriation and on intergovernmental and private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act.

	H.R. 5441 would expand regulation of and increase penalties for soring, the practice of inflicting pain to cause a horse to exaggerate its gait. CBO estimates that enacting H.R. 5441 would have an insignificant effect on both direct spending and revenues over the 2023-2032 period stemming from authority to collect civil and criminal penalties. CBO estimates that implementing the legislation would cost \$8 million over the 2023-2027 period, assuming appropriation of the necessary amounts. The legislation would impose a private-sector mandate a defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act that would not exceed the annual threshold of \$184 million in 2022 (adjusted annually for inflation). The legislation contains no intergovernmental mandates.

H.R. 6737 would authorize the appropriation of \$5 million a year from 2023 through 2033 to award grants to cities to collect exposure data on lead in local drinking water systems. CBO estimates that enacting H.R. 6737 would not affect direct spending or revenues. CBO estimates that implementing the bill would increase discretionary costs by \$21 million over the 2023-2027 period, assuming appropriation of the authorized amounts. The bill contains no intergovernmental or private-sector mandates as defined in the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act.
